We learned earlier in February that we are among many congregations that are in need of interim pastoral care and among congregations that are looking for new pastoral leadership. This will not be a quick process, but we are determind to do a thorough job and find the just right person for us in this time and place.

We want to say a special thank you to the pastors and deacon that have been leading worship each Sunday over the last couple months and in the Sundays yet to come. Dick Grinstad, Karen Selig, Don Corson, and coming in March, Gail Wheatley. We are blessed and have their leadership and support.

Should you need a pastoral visit or special care during these days between pastors, Dick Grinstad and Don Corson are available to meet with you and your family when needed. Please call the office and Natalie can help you make arrangements.

As the church council we are moving forward with a variety of plans and initiatives. Here are a few that we are currently working on:

- 1. Our preschool is already looking forward next year, hopefully expanding the days and the number of students attending. We'll soon be searching for a preschool teacher to fill the position of our, soon to be twice retired, Kathy Braun. Please let your friends and family know about our preschool and that we'll be looking for a new teacher.
- 2. Lenten Holden Evensong services and soup dinners on Wednesdays at 6:00pm will continue until Holy Week.
- We're still looking for more members in the choir, especially tenors. There are also some special events coming up, so watch for news regarding an upcoming concert
- 4. We'll be examining a proposal to upgrade our elevator, which will probably require a substantial fund raising campaign. This has the potential to put our elevator in good condition without needing to replace it entirely. More to come in the future.



In conclusion, we would also like to thank all of our staff members for their dedication and continued hard work during this transition time. We are grateful for them every day.



Martin Luther King: A Life (2023) By Jonathan Eig.





A Little Book of Self-Care for Those Who Grieve




finding something that resonates for today. Donated and reviewed by Sharon Buck.


Books for Children of All Ages:





The Big Bunny and the Easter Eggs (2018) By Steven Kroll and illustrated by Janet Stevens is an imaginative story of...maybe but probably not...how the tradition of hiding Easter Eggs came to be. The antics of this group of bunnies on Easter Ever are

Baby Bear's Book of Tiny Tales (2018) Written and



illustrated by David McPhail, consists of four short stories about Baby Bear. In each story he finds something. The fun part is reading on to see what he does with what he finds. As with most cleverly written animal stories, the interactions

March is Women's History Month, and at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church we will be blessed by hearing the organ and choir music of women composers throughout the month. Before I dive into this subject, I would like to also invite you to come to our Wednesday evening choir rehearsals throughout March to gain greater intimacy with the choir pieces we will be offering.

Perhaps you have noticed that the majority of music used in a sacred music setting (or any setting for that manner) is composed by men. This is not a coincidence and is certainly not because 'men are more gifted composers'; it is actually because the profession was reserved for men for hundreds of years. There are of course historical exceptions, which I can give examples of, but the fact of the matter lies in the subjugation of women under men. This is a dark truth about human behavior and culture, and while matriarchal and equal societies have developed in pockets around the earth, we still struggle as a human race for gender equality.

In this way, the world of music is no exception. Until 1800 the profession of composition was limited anyway, more or less to Germany and Austria, and exclusively reserved for men. There were women composers and songwriters throughout history, but many were never acknowledged: Hildegard of Bingen (1098–1179) is one who was.

Fanny Hensel (1805-1847) was a giant in the musical community and often considered one of the most talented European musicians of all time. In letters she asked her brother's blessing to self publish as opposed to ghostwrite, but sadly her brother Felix Mendelssohn discouraged her and scolded her for the idea of it.

In the 19th century, more women composers gained traction and exposure. Clara Schumann (1819-1896) was often referred to as being as good as, if not better than Franz Liszt as a virtuoso pianist and prodigious composer. In the 20th and 21st century more women composers emerged, not least luminaries like Dame Ethel Smyth (1858-1944), who also was an icon of the suffragette movement and an outspoken lesbian. In today's world, the art world is still dominated by men, with the concert hall and the world of sacred music featuring white male composers prominently.

I find my mind often going to what ifs, especially in the case of Fanny and the cultural requirement for her to get her brother's blessing to publish under her own name. I wonder if Felix were less conservative in this manner, what would have change. The relationship between Fanny and Felix as seen in their letters does change after this exchange, you can see the letters becoming shorter and, while still loving and devoted, less detailed and full of poetry and art. They become more logistical, and though the two virtuosi siblings remained loyal and entwined in the art world, there is a change. I wonder how things would be different if Fanny did self publish.. Questions like how would reception have been? Would we have seen more women composers publishing in her wake? Would there be a richer repertoire of Victorian Era music by women composers?

These what ifs are thinkers, but they accomplish nothing. This is why months like Women's History month exist, to give us a calendar event to focus our efforts on social justice. But we must extend beyond that. This is why the music program at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church will be making an effort to include music by Black, Indigenous and People of Color as well as women composers in our choir and organ repertoire-because the richness of music is too great to contain in just one month. Now ask me why there are so few women conductors!

News from Ailanga

The Ailanga Lutheran Junior Seminary is a boarding secondary school located in northern Tanzania near Arusha National Park and the Kenyan border. It was founded in 2003 by the Meru Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania, and educates students ages 13–20. In the summer of 2004, 17 Seattle students and chaperones journeyed to Tanzania answering an invitation to visit Ailanga. They experienced an incredibly warm and gracious

welcome as they worked and played together. What was learned, or reaffirmed, is that we are bound together by the hopes and dreams we have for our children. The Seattle delegates fell in love with the students and staff at Ailanga. The trip marked the start

of a partnership that continues today. The Ailanga School Project was formed in 2004 with member congregations Faith, Maple Leaf, Prince of Peace, and University Lutheran churches to support this partnership. Through contributions from our supporters, the Ailanga School Project has provided funds that Ailanga has used to improve their facilities and support their program, including addition of science laboratories that enabled Ailanga to obtain accreditation for advanced level science. Youth and adult delegations have traveled to Ailanga every two or three years; mostly due to COVID, the most recent trip was in 2019. Many returnees have said that this trip has been a life changing experience. We have been blessed to be a part of that mission with significant support for almost two decades.



Spilt Milk

During our brief deepfreeze this winter, I needed to thaw out the hummingbird feeder every two hours and



bring it in at night to defrost. Each morning, boots and coat on, I'd rehang the feeder on the lilac bush at the crack of dawn. One day I was met half way by a hungry hummingbird. It sipped ravenously then moved to the opening near my thumb, looked at it, looked at my face and flew off, maybe deciding it had been a bit reckless. Luckily I wasn't a predator.

This brought up a snapshot from my childhood. I would often reach for something across the table and knock over my glass...milk spilt, dignity bruised, reaching for a goal without considering what stood in the way.

As a society, this is how we've traditionally operated. We've polluted waterways, hunted and fished species to extinction, released poisons into the air and soil, gouged great sores in Mother Earth and more for what often appeared to be noble goals, but without acknowledging, understanding, or mitigating the collateral costs.

Even today, when we "reach for the Charmin" we're inadvertently knocking over a carbon sequestering tree in a Canadian forest. That was not our intention, but there it is. When we reach for pesticides we're negatively impacting the very pollinators that make our gardens fruit and bloom. There are so many actions we take with good intent that need to be reexamined. It's a new world where we're challenged to be more mindful of how our decisions affect the whole.

Along with examining our personal actions, we can vote for candidates who weigh decisions on this new scale. Recently the EPA banned a permit that

would have allowed gold mine waste to be dumped into Bristol Bay in Alaska. The ban saved one of the best salmon habitats on the planet and thousands of jobs. We can search out candidates for public office that use this kind of critical thinking and support them.

The old paradigm has left us "crying over spilt milk". The new paradigm is asking us to "look before we leap"...an old adage for a new day and a new frontier. Let's pioneer on.

Lutheran World Relief Kits and Quilts

We need your help! Every year we send several Personal Care Kits to Lutheran World Relief to be distributed throughout the world to assist people during times of need (i.e. natural disasters, geopolitical unrest). These kits include soap (2 bath size bars, totaling 8-9 oz. per kit), a sturdy comb, a metal nail clipper, a toothbrush in individual packaging and a towel. Our greatest need is lightweight towels. The towels need to be lightweight because they are usually washed by hand and need to be dried outside. LWR requests towels that are approximately 20x40 or 27x52 inches or in between. These towels can sometimes be found online in bulk for \$2-4 per towel. Or they can be purchased at thrift stores, if they are in like new condition (no stains or tears).

Year-to-date (YTD) offerings are \$13,230 below budget.

YTD operating revenue is \$14,140 below budget.

Year-to-date our net loss in revenue is \$18,888. When we add in our donor related finances, it lowers our loss to \$10,148.

Here are our Budget Busters

General Offerings: \$13,300 under budget

Preschool: \$1070 deficit

Radio Broadcast Donations: \$1,520 under cost Photo Copy Machine: \$1,800 over budget Support Staff Wages: \$8,200 over budget.

Note: the net personnel expenses are \$5,536 under budget.

Elevator Expenses: \$2,700 over budget

The preschool is exploring expanding hours for the next school year to help increase enrollment.

Continuation of radio broadcasts will need to be addressed by the council and concerned members before the end of this fiscal year. The increase from \$60 to \$100 per radio broadcast and high inflation has affected our revenue stream for this mission.

Before departing, the pastors trained our support staff to take over some of their duties. For example, Elijah Sussman is now our web master. We may see a permanent increase support staff hours, especially as we replace the pastor position from 1.5 to 1.0.

Now, the elephant in the room- the elevator. At our last annual meeting, members voted to keep the elevator operational, given that certain mechanical parts are no longer available and that Washington State will soon be implementing new elevator regulations that our elevator does not comply with.

We just received the elephant in the room. To upgrade our elevator to meet the new WA State elevator regulations as well as upgrade the system with new mechanical parts, a cost estimate of \$95,411.38 was submitted from the TK Elevator Company. This does not need to be decided today, but we will begin discussing this proposal after the sticker shock wears off.

During good times and with specific donations, we have been able to set money aside. Here are current balances of our savings and donor restricted funds.

Besides your generous general fund offerings \$215,800 this fiscal year, \$1430 to the food pantry, \$500 to the memorial garden, \$5,700 to the music program, \$900 to the pastors fund, \$1,900 to the preschool, \$7100 was donated for heating system upgrades, and \$3,600 for Thanksgiving baskets.
