...For this moment; this meal; these people ...

One of the Celtic Eucharistic liturgies that I love is from the Wee Worship Book from the Iona community in Scotland. These particular words come from the post-communion prayer: "In gratitude, in deep gratitude, for this moment, this meal, these people, we give ourselves to You. Send us out as changed people because we have received the Living Bread and cannot remain the same."

And this is really the point, isn't it? To come to church, being among others on this journey of faith, not to stay the same, but to be changed, formed more and more into the people God has created us to be: loving, generous, compassionate, forgiving, welcoming. If we came to church on Sunday or any other day to feel good about ourselves and then just go about business-as-usual, whatever that means, why bother? We come to the Table, to take Jesus into ourselves, to have him become a literal part of us, to strengthen us to do the work we've been given to do.

In this month of November, and season of gratitude and thanksgiving, our hearts turn toward those things for which we are grateful: our family, friends, home, vocation, community, church, this beautiful place where we live. And we pray about how we might be more faithful stewards of all that we have been given and how to be generous givers in return. Generosity begets generosity; story after story tells it. Jesus confirms it: "Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back." Luke 6:38

It reminds me of a conversation I once had with pastors about the Widow's Mite; how she put in everything she had, she gave extravagantly, not so little that it wouldn't be noticed when gone. One pastor said, "We're asked to give until our life is changed by our giving." Which brought to mind the CS Lewis quote, ""I do not believe one can settle how much we ought to give. I am afraid the only safe rule is to give more than we can spare." Until our life is changed by our giving....because we have received the Living Bread and cannot remain the same.

For the moments and the meals we share, for the people with whom we gather, for the Holy Spirit that binds us to one another, generation by generation, and sends us out as disciples of Jesus, I give God thanks. For the privilege it is to be together in worship, I give God thanks. For the ministry to the least, last, lost and lonely that we do, I give God thanks. For the generosity, welcome, inclusion, and compassion that is Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, I give God thanks.

Below is our financial overview for September, 2024.

This is our 3rd month of this fiscal year. Year to date we have a net loss of \$4005. Our expenses were \$8,000 less than budgeted as well as receiving \$5400 more in income than budgeted this month. The net loss is due to the low offerings in July and August. Offerings during the summer months are typically lower than the rest of the year, but this year's was lower than the last 3 years.

The \$0.01 in interest earnings listed in the spreadsheet is not a typo, unfortunately. Our one cent is the accrued interest from First Federal. Not listed as interest earnings is \$135 with the Mission Investment Fund.

Here is a further breakdown of our year to date donor restricted expenses: \$200 Food Pantry, \$170 Pastors Fund, \$470 Contingency Fund (Organ), \$3,900 Organist Houlihan Concert, and \$320 Bible School Total: \$5,100

Below is our year to date special and restricted donations:

\$170 Coffee & Chocolate, \$250 Elevator Upgrades, \$375 Food Pantry, \$75 LWR, \$50 Piano Maintenance, \$225 Pastors Fund, \$750 Preschool Donation, \$900 Radio Broadcast, \$4125 Rental Fees Total: \$8,000

In the short term, our personnel expenses will decrease as we no longer are paying a full time salary and benefits for a music director. With the weather getting colder, Dave may have to turn on the old furnace and we will see an increase in propane expenses.

The Preschool's current balance is \$1,600. The net revenue is due to \$900 in donations. Sadly, our preschool will close at the end of October.

From the bishops of the ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America):

In a perfect garden, created by God for the sake of humanity, evil entered in the form of deception and lies. Christians refer to this story, found in the biblical book of Genesis, as the *fall of humanity*. This foray into human sin began when Adam and Eve, the first humans created in the image of God, were deceived.

Humans have contended with the powers of deception ever since.

Yet we are a people who know and proclaim the power of God at work in the world. We proclaim the power of Jesus Christ, God in the flesh, the one who said, "I am the way, the truth and the life" (John 14:6).

We know that the power of truth is greater than the power of deceit.

We, the members of the Conference of Bishops of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, speak with one voice to condemn the hateful, deceptive, violent speech that has too readily found a place in our national discourse. We lament the ways this language has led to hate-fueled action.

We refuse to accept the ongoing normalization of lies and deceit.

We recommit ourselves to speaking the truth and pointing to the one who is truth. We find courage in our collegiality and implore the members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, as well as our partners and friends, to join us as we:

- Pledge to be vigilant guardians of truth, refusing to perpetuate lies or half-truths that further corrode the fabric of our society.
- Commit to rigorous fact-checking, honoring God's command to "test everything; hold fast to what is good" (1 Thessalonians 5:21).

- Reject the use of humor that normalizes falsehood, remembering that our speech should "always be gracious" (Colossians 4:6).
- Boldly advocate for the marginalized and oppressed, emulating Christ's love for the least among us.
- Courageously interrupt hate speech, standing firm in the knowledge that all are created in God's image.
- Lean in with curiosity, engage with those who think differently and "put the best construction on our neighbor's action" (Luther's explanation of the Eighth Commandment).
- Amplify voices of truth.

Emboldened by the Holy Spirit, may we resist deception and lift up the truth that all members of humanity are created in the image of God.

May the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with us all as we respond to the Spirit's invitation into this intentional commitment against deception and for truth.






Green Winter: Celebrations of Old Age (1997) by


The Very Fairy Princess Sparkles in The Snow





The Parent of All Virtues

That's what Roman philosopher Marcus Tullius Cicero called gratitude.



The quote: "Gratitude is not only the greatest of virtues, but the parent of all the others." This implies that gratitude is a foundation for developing qualities such as kindness, empathy, and humility.

Modern science confirms that the practice of gratitude actually rewires the brain, releasing dopamine and serotonin, fostering an overall sense of wellbeing. Consistent practice can retrain the brain to more easily deflect negative thoughts and experiences and to retain the positive. Three ways to practice gratitude:

<u>Appreciate others</u>: This doesn't have to be grandiose. Some people find it hard to accept compliments. How about "Thank you", "Well done", "You're the greatest", "That was wonderful"...you get the idea.

<u>Volunteer</u>: Again, simple works: Smile, hold the door for someone, allow someone to go first, lend a hand, share what you have.

Appreciate what's in front of you: This is earthfriendly gratitude, and where the "western" mind can have a blind spot. Like a stone skipping across the water, many of us hop along the surface of our lives, skipping from purchase to purchase, person to person, event to event in stead of slowing down and enjoying what's at hand. For our and the planet's benefit, our response to what we have could be mindful, deep, and satisfying. Mindful appreciation is really nothing new. We can take a cue from native cultures: The Plains nations' respect for and sustainable relationship with the bison; our Pacific Northwest indigenous nations' practice of song, prayer and permission before harvesting berries or cedar bark. Some practice ideas: When you peel that potato for Thanksgiving dinner, think about what a delicious miracle it really is. The next time you put on a pair of socks, have the mind of someone unhoused with a new

pair of socks for cold, wet feet. Slow down, observe and appreciate. When we appreciate what we have, we need and use less.

And finally, a quote from Meister Eckhart: "If the only prayer you ever say in your entire life is thank you, it will be enough."
