## **Black History Month at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church**



This February, we will be singing and hearing sacred music by composers of the African diaspora. Sacred music of African Americans has played a crucial role in shaping the musical identity of all of the United States. ## **Holy Trinity Library**




#### One Potato: A Counting Book of Potato Prints

Monkey and the Little One (2015) by Claire Alex-




#### Tiger Days: A Book of Feelings (2018) by Wash-


Roar of A Snore (2006) by Marsha Arnold, pictures



A day before the closing of Seminary, three visitors from the USA – the greater Milwaukee synod (Wisconsin state), visited the Seminary and we informed them about you from Seattle. I also wrote and gave them your email address. I hope they will contact you.

From January 2024, the Diocese of Meru appointed a new chaplain for Ailanga. He is Rev. John A. Mbise. He is one of the first graduates of Ailanga Seminary in 2006.

We will communicate for more details as soon as possible after opening the office on January 5th 2024.

We wish for all of you the peace and joy that the miracle of Christ's birth brings this season and always. Thank you for your continued support of the preschool!



## **Creation Care**

Optimism "...whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things." (Philippians 4:8)

Food for thought. And if there was ever a food shortage it's finding good news these days. But it's out there.

Climate-wise, our own state is one year into the Climate Commitment Act which is projected to reduce greenhouse gases by 95% by 2050. Businesses working to avoid paying for pollution "allowances" are incentivized to find ways to reduce carbon emissions. Meanwhile, revenue from allowances is funding clean energy efforts such as electric school buses, free transit rides, rebates for heat pumps and other high efficiency electric equipment and incentives for various commercial vehicles to go electric. It's also helping fund a large-scale solar project by the Yakima Nation and is attracting green industries to the state.

Washington State Ferries, the biggest greenhouse gas emitter among state agencies, will be totally hybrid-electric by 2040 drastically reducing emissions and saving million in fuel cost. The first two vessels are expected spring 2028...how exciting!

Total operating expenses were \$4,200 below expenses changing the YTD to \$22,623 below budget. The primary reason for reduced costs was a decrease in expenses for building and yard maintenance. Year-to-date our net revenue is a loss of \$4,200.

When we add in our donor related finances, we have a loss of \$46,500. These expenses were paid from donor accounts, such as heat pump project or the contingency fund.

#### 6 Month Deep Dive into Budgeted Categories

**Personnel Expenses:** We have been able to keep personnel expenses (payroll and salary benefits) \$5,000 below budget. As Karen Selig shared with us last Sunday, the changing of pastors opens new doors. Well it will open our financial door and we will see an additional decrease to our personnel expenses. On January 1st, we will not be paying for a 1.5 pastor salary and benefits. Our pastor payroll will be approximately \$800 per month with our substitute pastors. When the interim pastor is hired, this will only be a 1.0 position, not a 1.5 position.

As we budgeted a \$30,000 deficit for this year, this decrease in expenses will help lower our deficit.

Above you will see a breakdown of our general and administrative expenses as well as ministry expenses. I have included the entire year's budget as a reference.

General and Administrative Expenses: Office equipment and maintenance has increased due to an increase in the monthly photocopy machine rental rate along with increased usage of photocopy paper and postage. Building and yard maintenance expenses are \$5,500, but we had a credit from Parish Plumbing for \$9,800, so you see this -\$4300 actual amount. This credit was from expenses that were paid for during the last fiscal year. I will move this credit, so we can see our true expenses for this year. Janitorial expenses are higher than the last 3 years. This may be due to using temporary staff. Building safety and elevator expenses continue to be impossible to budget. We recently had elevator and boiler L&I inspections, but the main culprit is increasing elevator upkeep costs.

**Ministry Expenses:** Youth and family ministries is the only account with a red flag. The increased expenses are due to an effort to bring in more youth and families.

#### **Preschool Financials:**

We currently have 6 students enrolled.

Net revenue shows a loss of \$1,879. Because of the low enrollment numbers, an \$8,230 deficit was budgeted for this fiscal year. But due to severe cuts in new materials and training, we may only see a deficit of \$4,000 this year.

**Fundulgencies:** You thought I forgot. Below is the breakdown of our Fundulgency Fundraiser for the Contingency Fund:

Organ expenses: \$2,107.47

Net increase to Contingency Fund: \$1,765.48 Noah was able to have the organ repaired and \$1,765 was added to our contingency fund. Thank you all.


Our church has participated in this rewarding service opportunity in years past. We can share Christ's love by providing a warm meal once in each season of the year!

#### **Thanksgiving Shopping Report 2023**



Thank you so much to all who generously donated their time and money for our Thanksgiving shopping this year!

We received donations totaling \$3630! We shopped for 10 families chosen through Lutheran Community Services (LCS) and had enough money left over to give a \$400 Visa Gift Card to Lisa Lyons at LCS. This combined with 13 turkeys (Safeway donated a free frozen turkey for each \$100 spent) will go towards providing holiday meals in December, again through LCS. So your gifts continue to provide for our neighbors in need!

There is *still* some carryover money. We will transfer some of the funds to our Little Food Pantry Fund and carry the balance over until next year. How wonderful to be able to share God's blessings to with others!

#### Lutheran World Relief Kits and Quilts

We need your help! Every year we send several Personal Care Kits to Lutheran World Relief to be distributed throughout the world to assist people during times of need (i.e. natural disasters, geopolitical unrest). These kits include soap (2 bath size bars, totaling 8-9 oz. per kit), a sturdy comb, a metal nail clipper, a toothbrush in individual packaging and a towel. Our greatest need is lightweight towels. The towels need to be lightweight because they are usually washed by hand and need to be dried outside. LWR requests towels that are approximately 20x40 or 27x52 inches or in between. These towels can sometimes be found online in bulk for \$2-4 per towel. Or they can be purchased at thrift stores, if they are in like new condition (no stains or tears). You can place any donations in the box labeled LWR below the coat rack by the church office.
