## Pastor's Pen By Beth Orling

Last month, ten days before Pentecost, the wider church marked the Ascension: the event that helped the early church understand why Jesus was no longer with them bodily. I told the story to some children in a church with large open windows above the chancel. As I was concluding the story, one little boy raised his hand, looked up at the windows, and declared, "I think I see Jesus."

Since then, here at Holy Trinity, we have celebrated Pentecost (with three women confirming their baptismal faith!) and Jasper Robert Kennedy's Baptism on Holy Trinity Sunday. Now we launch into the "green" growing season of "Sundays after Pentecost."

But I want to talk a bit about those 10 days between Ascension and Pentecost, between Jesus leaving his followers and the coming of the Holy Spirit, between the disciples being terrified of dying like Jesus did and 10 days later finding their voices and becoming preaching apostles. If ever there were a time of TRANSITION, it was those 10 days. We know the men and women were filled with the Holy Spirit on Pentecost, but they didn't know that yet.

During that time of transition, they may have remembered the prayers Jesus said for them the night in which he was betrayed. Jesus prayed that they might be protected, that they might be united, that they might have joy, and lastly that they may be made holy – sanctified – in God's truth. Protected, united, made joyful and made holy.

This remains Jesus' prayer for us to this day. Jesus prays that Holy Trinity Lutheran Church – and all of us, and all faith communities – may be protected, united, made joyful and made holy.

Part of this well-being includes being protected from and guided through anxiety that arises during times of transition. Anxiety says, "Hurry." Anxiety says, "You'd better do this right." Anxiety says, "How long, O Lord, long?"

Joyful faith says, "Your will be done, Lord." Joyful hope says, "Our new pastor will be here in God's good time." Joyful love says, "As we wait, we trust the Holy Spirit and we care for one another." And the greatest of these is love.

Whether we feel anxious or confident, may we continue to trust that God's will be done in our lives. The church explained the Ascension as necessary so that Jesus could be with all of us in all places all the time, not just in the Holy Land for 33 years. Like the little boy hearing the Ascension story, may we also look up and say, "I think I see Jesus." This past Ascension Day, Pastor Gail closed her email to me with these words, "See you around, Jesus!"

While we journey through this time of transition, we see Jesus in church and in one another. See you around, Jesus!

## **Holy Trinity Library**




#### **ADULT BOOKS:**

#### Robert F. Kennedy: Ripples of Hope (2018) By




caring "system of friends". You will be educated and moved by Kidder's hopeful and compelling narrative. Reviewed by Ann Marie Rahfeldt.


Good Grief (2004) By Lolly Winston. Sophie Stan-



ton, a 36 year old, in a therapy session is wondering how she can be a widow. Her husband died of Hodgkin's Disease. With laugh out loud humor, author, Lolly, takes Sophie through the recovery process from losing her job, house and dealing with a controlling mother-in-law. She

gets a fresh start, moving from San Jose to Ashland, Oregon, when invited by a friend, to escape her former life. She progresses to find housing, employment, new relationships, including mentoring a defiant 13 year old from the Boys and Girls Club. #### Crater Lake: The Story Behind the Scenery (1991)

The Wednesday Surprise (1989) By Eve Bunting





I Love Construction Vehicles (2016) By Chris Oxlade. Do you have a kiddo in your life who adores




all things construction" If so, this is the book for them. From diggers, loaders and dump trucks to cranes, concrete mixers and tunneling machines, this children's nonfiction title combines



We have identified some youth and some adults who are interested and available for a 2025 trip. Youth should have completed their 10<sup>th</sup> grade year in school before going on the trip.

We are now excited to schedule in-person meetings (1 hour), to get more acquainted. There will be one meeting in Seattle and another meeting in Port Angeles. The board has sent emails to determine dates and times for the meetings. The intent is to have these meetings before the end of the school year. We hope to hear what concerns or questions you may have. We also hope to begin planning for monthly meetings starting in the fall.

#### News from Ailanga Headmaster

(4/27) Receive greetings from Ailanga and Meru Diocese.

Many greetings from Ailanga staff and students community. We thank God, because it is still raining, but we are safe.

Thank you for your greetings and support. It is a great support because the Seminary is aiming to pay back the soft loan from May 15, this year. The way you proposed it is fine. We will figure out the debt of student Sumsri and let you know. The loan which enabled us to buy a car was Tsh.28,000,000.( It is approximately USD 11,000.) Currently the number of students registered is 230, all in boarding.

#### **Donation to Ailanga**

In response to the Ailanga request, the board decided to and sent \$6000 to Ailanga, \$4000 to pay back part of the loan for the car, and \$2000 to continue scholarships for selected students.

### **Death Cleaning**

A few years back I read a short, humorous book entitled <u>The Gentle Art of Swedish Death Cleaning</u> by Margareta Magnusson, about clearing out unneces-



sary belongings before others have to do it for you. Her methods can make the process uplifting and rewarding (must revisit for "booster shot"). Not only rewarding for the purger, putting useful items back to work in a new household reduces unnecessary purchases and is ultimately good for the planet. After all, what good is an unread book or an unworn sweater? If you have accounting principles in your background, you know that dead stock taking up warehouse space costs money. Excess clutter can have an energetic and emotional cost.

Getting down to business...

What's your style? It's often suggested you start with three boxes—toss, donate, and save. Author Ann Patchett in her essay "How to Practice" did her purge from an author's perspective—first you write and then you edit. So everything she purged went into boxes in the basement that were "edited" later. I apply a half hour principle—decisions start out very black and white, but I start to waiver after half an hour.

<u>Tackling emotions</u>. Anne Patchett felt shame over owning seven mixing bowls and wondered if the wine glasses were tired of waiting to be used. She found that much of what she'd acquired was for a future self that never materialized and let it go. We evolve.

Family keepsakes are more problematic. I have an Imari plate my great grandmother gave me when I turned sixteen. It means nothing to my granddaughter and isn't her style. But maybe the tiny turquoise and silver cross Grandma gave me will appeal. Think about the future not the past. Anne's journey was inspired by the passing of her childhood friend's father and the Herculean task of cleaning out his house. Somewhat ironically, amongst the accumulation was this prayer:

I have everything I need. All that is not ladder falls away.
