

Dogwoods by Pastor gail Wheatley

For those who were at the 11:00 "meet and greet" in the Fireside Room April 21, you heard me talk about the Memorial Cross at my seminary (Sewanee – University of the South) and what a part it played in my path to ordination. Well, here it is in its springtime dogwood splendor. I didn't know a thing about dogwoods until I went to Tennessee and found a beautiful one in the courtyard of a local church; parishioners there swore it bloomed right on schedule during Holy Week every year, no matter the date of Easter. Who was I to argue?

There is a legend about dogwoods, most of which IS completely legendary, but it makes for interesting imagery. Legend has it that Jesus was crucified on a dogwood although where that came from no one knows, because dogwoods do not grow in Israel. The blossoms are not really the blossoms, they are bracts and the flowers are the small round clusters inside. Nonetheless, the four white bracts are associated with the arms of the cross and the red tinged tips of each bract with the wounds or nail prints of Jesus. Therefore, the blooming of the tree at Easter is symbolic of the beauty of new life and resurrection. It's a lovely story and it probably sells trees even if it is fiction. There are dogwoods growing here on the peninsula as well and I see them in bloom near Lake Crescent where they are an understory tree, on the edges of the forest. We have one in our yard which is the last of all the trees to bloom. Even now, it barely has leaves beginning to bud, let alone "flowers." But bloom it will in its time.

Humans have a way, and perhaps a need, to use visual imagery and metaphor to express what words sometimes fail to do. There is certainly no



"harm" in seeing Christ's death and resurrection in the beauty of a blooming dogwood. But we can also take that meaning we

are trying to express to a deeper level; perhaps the metaphor helps us swim in the deep theological waters, as my spiritual director describes it, as we attempt to express the inexpressible.

Resurrection is the ultimate of God's love in the promise and assurance of new life from what we once thought was dead. And how we respond to that gift of life is an expression of how we receive, internalize and then act upon resurrection. Br. Curtis Almquist from the Society of St. John the Evangelist wrote a beautiful paragraph about this very thing and it applies equally well to individuals and a parish in transition, such as we are; not necessarily about death, but change. "The ancient language of the church speaks of the "Paschal Mystery" – that life comes out of death, amazingly enough. Out of Christ's death comes life, and so for us. If there's something you need to pronounce 'dead' or 'deadly' in your life, pronounce it. If there something of your past life that's simply on a ventilator, let it die. It's the only way you will know life, know the resurrection life that Jesus promises."

The dogwoods will soon be in bloom and the Great Fifty Days continue for a couple weeks yet. This is a time of reflection and discernment about what gives life at Holy Trinity, what is no longer lifegiving and can be left behind, and what the blossoms of new life and possibilities can be. With God, all things are possible; alleluia alleluia!





Legacy: A Black Physician Reckons With Racism in Medicine (2024) By Uche Blackstock, MD. This



land in 1933 and moved her students there amid restrictions on emigrating. Parents signed up and sent their children away knowing they might never see them again. "Featuring moving, firsthand testimony from surviving pupils, and drawing from letters, diaries and present-day interviews...This is a dramatic human tale that offers a unique perspective on Nazi persecution and the Holocaust. It is also the story of one woman's refusal to allow her belief in a better world to be overtaken by hatred and violence" (From Book Jacket) Reviewed by Margaret Ruud.


BOOKS FOR CHILDREN AND THE YOUTHFUL:


My Pen (2015) By Christopher Myers. A fantastically illustrated pen and ink story about how one



can change perspective with drawings. The gentle tale describes varied ways to observe the world and how each of us can create our own space. Pick up a pen, a crayon or a brush






ryone's life richer. This is a delightful story that readers will definitely enjoy. I did. Re-Reviewed by Zorba Alexis-Stricker.

Not My Life (2011) Written/ Directed/Produced by Robert Bilheimer is a documentary on the global problem of human trafficking and modern slavery. Filmed in twelve countries, including the US, it is both heartbreaking and inspiring. Yes, it describes cruel and

A Boomer's Deeper Dive in the Plastic Pool

Shortly after writing last month's article, I received a publication from Green America with more plastic reduction ideas. (Read full



article here: https://www.greenamerica.org/ways-ditch-plastic-your-daily-life)

<u>Laundry</u>: This usually entails a large plastic jug of detergent and non-recyclable polyester squares infused with chemicals (dryer sheets). Boomers: remember when powdered detergent came in a cardboard box? Still a good idea today. Or try detergent strips. Dryer sheets can be replaced with wool dryer balls or white vinegar in the rinse cycle.

On The Go: One million single-use water bottles are sold every minute resulting in 25+ million tons of plastic waste annually. Also, a study by the National Academy of Science revealed that single-use plastic bottles release micro-plastics into our bodies where they can migrate to the lungs and bloodstream. Invest in a reusable water bottle. Also, bring your own coffee cup, sustainable straw, and reusable to-go containers to your local café or restaurant.

Bath: I've been using both shampoo and conditioner in bar form for several years with no complaints. Shaving soap, lotion, and (wait for it) soap are also available in this form. (BTW: When shaving soap was first introduced, Einstein supposedly said, "Why would I need another soap?" While no one wants that hair, it's a principle worth pondering). Boomers: remember the Push-Up, that frozen treat in a cardboard tube? That's how my deodorant is delivered (plastic free pit performance)...available from many sources.

Lobby: Talk to the owners of your favorite shops, restaurants, and cafes about switching to more sustainable materials for straws, bags and the like. Read about the Break Free From Plastics Act introduced in Congress in October 2023, and consider contacting your US senator and representative to support it. We're all in this soup together. Every

Target summer 2025 delegation trip

The Ailanga School Project board has decided to target a delegation trip to Ailanga in the summer (late July-early August) of 2025. 

Our year to date net operating revenue is \$4,359! Thank you all!

We are also \$11,782 under budget. This number looks good on paper, but is deceiving as our budget prediction for this fiscal year was for a loss of \$32,000. So we must continue to keep our eye on the prize-the net operating revenue.

In the other revenue section, we have donor restricted income. These are donations that were given to the church for a specific purpose, such as the heat pump or the food bank. The majority of these funds are not budgeted for. Actually the only budgeted amount was \$2,100 for preschool donations.

Our net revenue for other restricted income shows a loss of \$28,257. This means that we are using funds that we have set aside for a specific purpose, such as a heat pump. This is a double edged sword, as we are using funds appropriately, but this lowers our bottom line. Our savings balance has decreased. I know, treasurers are never happy.

The 2024-2025 budget proposal was distributed at the church on April 21, 2024 and can be found on the church's website. I would be more than happy to email a copy of the budget to you as well. The budget proposal will be printed in mid May for the annual meeting on June 2, 2024. Please contact me with any budget questions or concerns as we are still in the negotiation stage, at least until Natalie pushes the print button for the annual report.

Thank you for your prayers, efforts, and donations that help Holy Trinity Lutheran Church grow and develop as we continue our walk with the Lord. God's blessings are upon you.
