In December, 2008, we moved from Havre, MT, (where -30^o was not unusual) to Port Angeles. There was a rose still blooming at the house we rented. Shortly after that a mystery flower began to

bloom along the front sidewalk. That turned out to be a hellebore. Christmas rose, Lenten rose, take your pick. Here's one from our yard today:



It seemed so miraculous to me, so positively unheard of in the depths of a Montana winter, that I vowed to plant several when we bought a house. Which we have. I also decided to visit Butchart Gardens in Victoria once/month for a year to really watch the seasonal cycles. And to my surprise, my favorite month was February.

In February, you are essentially alone in the Gardens. You can see the "bones" of the place without leaves or flowers; the skeleton of life there is very moving. Some early daffodils and snowdrops are on the rise; the English daisies have been blooming all winter. The rhodies are getting heavy with buds. And it feels like the earth is moving under your feet. Life is straining to the surface, reaching toward the sun. It knows, even better than we do, that we are gaining 3+ minutes of light each day, and the plants know what to do with it. The changing seasons are glorious in anticipation.

February this year is still fully in the season of Epiphany. Lent doesn't arrive until March 5 so the lovely stars will get extra weeks to shine for us. The Transition Team is hard at work pulling together the pieces needed to complete the Ministry Site Profile to submit to the Synod so that the call process can begin. We thank them for their diligence. It is a quiet, fallow time of patience, anticipation, settled days until spring really bursts forth; even as my daffodils are in bud already. Life may not feel very settled right now; people may find themselves "glued to" the news, dealing with health or family or financial issues, or community and forgetting to look down, up and around for beauty and solace.

Please don't fall into pious platitudes of "God's got this," or "everything happens for a reason," or "God has a plan." We are God's plan. We are the hands and feet and souls of God's plan. And we need to be prepared to do the work we are given to do of actively loving God and our neighbor. Listen to beautiful music. Take a Sabbath walk to see what tiny thing is blooming near your feet. Draw, write, read a classic children's book like The Secret Garden. Watch a sunrise or sunset. Check out the amazing planetary alignment. Take the Coho when it's back mid-month and check out Butchart. The earth is alive and we are part of it; do something special for her this month. She is our most precious gift from God. Let Hurricane Ridge take your breath away.

Actively support the things that are important to you, that align with the values of a Christian community that believes in the life and teachings of Jesus. Step away from the news if you need to. Step closer to your faith community, your family and neighbors; walk in love, as Christ loved us. With God, all things are possible. Let's plan a field trip to Victoria.

The Transition Team is pleased to report that we are well into the writing of the Ministry Site Profile document required by the Synod. We hope to bring it to the Council in early February for review and approval. Copies will be available for all members to review as well.

Folks mentioned with joy our congregation's wide WELCOME to all; at the Lord's Table, at the coffee hour, to the LGBTQ community though our RIC (Reconciling in Christ) commitment, through our commitments to many ministries within and outside this building.

We are committed to care for God's good Creation via our membership signing in the ecumenical Charter of Creation and through our varied Creation Care efforts.

We value our tradition of strong preaching. We celebrate being a place in the community where fine music is foundational in our worship and in community music events. We are thankful for our wonderful facility used by many community groups.

We also discussed some of our sadnesses regarding life at HTLC in this time of community, cultural, political, climatological transition and change.

Time and time again in many and various ways we heard a yearning from participants for community; for ways to connect with God and each other, for empathetic, compassionate Pastoral care, for ongoing learning and faith formation, for able administration and faithful stewardship of our building and lands.

While we complete this step in writing the MSP, we ask this of all of you. Continue your prayers for Holy Trinity. Pray for our work together, for our members, and for the Pastoral candidates who might be interested in sharing our Mission. We can trust that God has a leader in mind for God's church here!!!

The trio will serve as ambassadors for the Clallam County Fair, attending various parades, community events, and activities to promote the fair and celebrate local traditions.


Winter Ballet Gala with PASO and Music on the Strait

I sent away for Unity's 2024 advent booklet, the theme and title this year: "Be Not Afraid."



I was particularly impressed with an opening story by Rev. Linda Martella-Whitsett in which she recalled being a student in an American ashram in 1977. During a question and answer period, a distraught student asked the guru which spiritual practice or teacher he should follow to address his terrible fear. The author thought it odd that the student should ask about teachers other than the one present. But the guru just calmly listened, paused and then said something simple but profound:

"Just do the next thing."

The guru explained that a brain paralyzed by fear shuts down and has no place to go. So, make your bed, take out the trash, eat lunch, gently proceed with your life...do the next thing.

It's New Year's resolution time again and the master key to success in that area might also be "Just do the next thing." Discouraged with current affairs? Just do the next thing. Worried about the state of God's beautiful earth? Just do the next thing.

If you'd like some positive reinforcement from amazing stories of planet-saving actions and innovations, there are a couple of YouTube channels I can recommend. <u>Plant Wild</u> is a global community of people on a mission to bring back endangered species and clean up waterways. <u>Sam Bentley</u> hosts a monthly good news recap of positive and innovative solutions that are healing our planet. These are heartening and encouraging stories of people doing the next thing.


And finally remember, "...do not be anxious for your life...which of you by being anxious can add one cubit to his span of life?" (see Matthew 6:25-35 for the full quote).


<u>The Soloist (2008)</u> by Steve Lopez is a deeply



moving, true story about Nathaniel Ayers, a homeless street musician with a Juilliard background. Suffering from schizophrenia and living out of a shopping cart, he plays a battered violin on noisy street corners on Skid Row, not for money but for joy. The author befriends him, the transformation


in both men's lives is profound. Hopeful, sad, triumphant, discouraging, heartening and humbling, this is a sensitive portrait of the homeless, the mentally ill and the care system,,,, lavishly embellished by the transformative power of music. Reviewed by Anita Bonham.

<u>Strength to Love (1963)</u> by Martin Luther King, Jr. This beautiful replacement copy of MLK's powerful writings about nonviolence and God's continuing love are very relevant for today's world. Taken mostly from his sermons, these are powerful short



pieces that can help us see our way through these times. Reviews by Ann Marie Rahfeldt.


Our Ancient Faith: Lincoln, Democracy, and the American Experiment (2024) by Allen C. Guelzo, a

Consent and sovereignty of the people and adherence to prudent laws is foundational. We must do what we can to save it. 

My Name is Not Alexander: Just How Big Can a


