Pastor's Pen

Have friends ever told you with a proud grin or a sad smile how they were giving up chocolate or ice cream or meat or alcohol for Lent? I always felt a little guilty, hearing this, as I am not a particularly pious or disciplined person. One friend tells me every year she's giving up Lent for Lent. She says she doesn't like "wallowing in sin" and feeling bad about Jesus' hard work and suffering.

It doesn't have to be that way. "Lent", which comes from the word for Spring, is simply the time in the church year when we read the stories of Jesus' last days on earth. Life is not always happy and neither was Jesus' work and life. This year we hear powerful stories we love, such as the Prodigal Son (and his brother) and Mary anointing Jesus. There is the story of Jesus' temptation (40 days in the wilderness emblematic of the 40 days of Lent). People warn Jesus about Herod wanting to kill him. There is the answer – or non-answer – to "why bad things happen to good people" and the gardener who begs his boss not to cut down an unfruitful tree but to give it one more year. We'll hear the Palm Sunday and Holy Week stories in April. These stories lead us into a time of selfexamination and gratitude, perhaps also to awe for the grace and love we see in Jesus' resolve to go to the cross and his words and tears along the way. The stories of Lent guide us. I don't challenge you to "give up chocolate" or anything else – but feel free to do that. I offer the list below for us to consider some practices to "take on" during these 40 days. You can learn about some of the saints of the church if you play "Lent Madness" described later in this newsletter. You can quietly offer money to groups that help the poor.

May God bless your Lenten practices whatever

they may be and may God's Holying Spirit open our ears and hearts to the stories and prayers of Lent and bring us all to a joyful Easter Day!

Day 1: Pray for your enemies

Day 2: Don't turn on the car radio

Day 3: Give \$20 to a non-profit

Day 4: Take 5 minutes of silence at noon

Day 5: Look out the window until you find some-

thing of beauty you had not noticed before

Day 6: Give 5 items of clothing to Goodwill

Day 7: Do someone else's chore

Day 8: Buy a few \$5-\$10 fast food gift cards to

give to homeless people you encounter

Day 9: Call or text or email an old friend

Day 10: Pray the Paper (pray for people and situa-

tions in today's news)

Day 11: Forgive someone

Day 12: Tell someone what you are grateful for

Day 13: Introduce yourself to someone at church

whom you don't know yet

Day 14: Light a candle

Day 15: Pray for peace

Day 16: Bring food to church for the little free

food pantry

Return to the top and continue again.

"Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." Matthew 25:40

Jesus told his disciples that what we do to the "least of these" people near and far is what we do to him. The quote below from the Episcopal Office of Government Relations expresses our beliefs as well. We do not tell people how to vote. But we do take notice when even a "mere" 1% of our national budget which was to go to help the hungriest, sickest and most destitute people in the world is withheld. Here is part of how the letter from the Episcopal office reads.

"...we express alarm at the changes made to the US Agency for International Development. These changes, including a pause in funding and staff cuts, have impacted expert staff at the forefront of national interests as well as put longstanding and successful programs at risk. Abruptly cutting off vital humanitarian and development assistance is not in

the best interest of the United States, nor does it align with the Gospel values that Jesus has taught us and for which our church advocates.

Our church does not have a stance on bureaucratic structures; we do, however, have a commitment to **loving our neighbor as ourselves.** We also stand by our commitment to promoting democratic values, good governance, and human rights that reinforce the rights of all people around the world. The human family is no less connected because of distance and circumstance. Foreign assistance is less than 1% of the federal budget, and yet we know that investment saves lives. As Christians we must speak up for continued investments that help alleviate suffering

and create conditions where humans and their environments can flourish."




"Climate Conversations" - a monthly zoom from the Creation Care ministry at St. Mark's Cathedral in Seattle




The Serviceberry: Abundance and Reciprocity in the Natural World

(2024) by Robin Wall Kimmerer.
"This is a thought provoking
extended essay that explores the
gift economy in the natural world.
Using the example of a
serviceberry tree, which forms a



symbiotic relationship with birds, Kimmerer examines how we can foster sharing, generosity and abundance in human communities," We see it operating in small ways like the little free pantry and the little free libraries. Scarcity, which appears to be what undergirds our current economy, isn't a very fruitful way to operate. She challenges us to rethink consumption and encourage us to "harvest honorably" with responsibly, restraint, respect, reverence and reciprocity. Reviewed by Ann Marie Rahfeldt.

The Art of Happiness at Work (2003) by His




Holiness the Dalai Lama and Howard C. Cutler, MD. The two have teamed up to write a sequel following their successful book, The Art Of Happiness. The Dalai Lama asked Dr. Cutler if he was happier after putting into practice ideas in the book; wanting to be of service and

helpful to his fellow man. Having unanswered questions, they embarked on The Art of Happiness at Work. The first book focused on inner development but life exists beyond that. There are many pressures in society, family and work. We are not programmed to achieve happiness only by productive activity and work. Life is complex, consisting of folk having different backgrounds,

abilities, interests, personalities, dispositions and social situations. The way we perceive the world is more important for happiness than objective circumstances. It is interesting to follow the thoughts of the Dalai Lama as he is interviewed. Reviewed by Margaret Ruud.

Genius: A Photobiography of Albert Einstein

BOOKS FOR CHILDREN


Sylvia's Spinach (2012) by Katherine Pryor is a




