Pastors Message

Lent 2019 - a Time to Widen your Horizon and Practice Mindfulness

Since Days Immemorial, human beings have challenged themselves in a variety of ways to grow in character and spirit. In our Christian tradition, Lent can be such a time of spiritual challenge.

Some people walk in pilgrimage. A famous pilgrimage leads through all of Spain to the grave of St. James in Santiago de Compostela. The famous sight is not the goal of the journey though, it is rather the end point. The walk itself is the goal. - To get up and get going in the morning even when the feet are full of blisters and hurt mightily. - To continue on through days full of rain, with clothes which don't even properly dry overnight. To move on, when the sun shines hot and the water bottle is empty. To not think about anything else, but the path ahead for days at a time. And then the other side of it: The amazing sunset; the unexpected view; the encounter with wildlife; the relationships with people you meet; the inexplicable God experiences on the way.

Other people fast. Throughout Christian history, believers have fasted during the time of Lent, in imitation of Jesus' 40 days in the desert, before his journey of public ministry began. In the Orthodox Church, this is still done today. One meal a day is allowed during Lent, and meat, fish, dairy products, wine and oil are excluded from that meal. This is not meant as punishment or sacrifice, but as a time to practice self-control, and to focus on God in preparation for the Easter Feast of Jesus' resurrection. Fasting can be an amazing experience. It teaches you to overcome hunger. That skill can then also be applied in other situations. You might be able to overcome fear, sadness, or anger when needed. Fasting also teaches you to appreciate and enjoy your meals in more meaningful ways. You learn to neither obsess about things, nor to take them for granted.

Spiritual challenges like pilgrimage and fasting help us to experience life in new and different ways. They help us to think outside of the box and to overcome obstacles within ourselves. They bring us closer to God by widening our horizon and by teaching us mindfulness and better control of our feelings and actions.

How can you widen your horizon this Lent?

Travelling is not an absolute requirement for pilgrimage journeys. You can very well practice prayerful, meditative walking at home. Please only consider vigorous hiking, if your health allows. Virtual travel can be an alternative: <http://caminosantiago360.com/en/> is an application, which brings the sacred walk to Santiago to you in the virtual world. And there are many more virtual pilgrimages to be found all over the internet, for example here: <https://catholicpilgrimagesites.wordpress.com/virtual-tours-e-pilgrimages/>

How can you practice mindfulness?

However, fasting is just one of many ways of practicing mindfulness. Please only fast, if your health allows. Another food-related path to mindfulness is making an effort to buy fair trade items like the coffee and chocolate available at Holy Trinity's office. Look out for pictures of farmers inside the chocolate packaging who have provided the ingredients for your product! To support our local communities as well, increase the amount of items you buy locally, either at the farmer's market, or in the supermarket (locally produced items are oftentimes highlighted in the shelves).

I invite you to find a way to widen your horizon and to practice mindfulness this Lent, which begins March 6, on Ash Wednesday, and ends April 17, on Maundy Thursday. Pilgrimage and fasting are but two examples. The Ash Wednesday service on March 6, as well as Holden Evening Prayers on the following Wednesdays are wonderful mindfulness offerings. The World Day of Prayer service on March 8, and the Developmental Disability Awareness Day on March 16 are great events to help widen your horizon. We will also provide special devotional material for adults and children in the Narthex (Entrance Hall). Our special giving project this Lent will be to Habitat for Humanity as we prepare for a 'Faithbuild' in 2020. Look out for the little piggy-bank houses in the Narthex (Entrance Hall)!

The end point of our Lenten journey is Easter. At the Easter feast, we will 'resurrect' with renewed insight, purpose, and vigor on our path of discipleship!

ADULT BOOKS

Love Without Limits: Jesus' Radical Vision for Love with No Exceptions (2018) by Jacequeline A. Bussie is a memoir of stories exemplifying the commandment Jesus said was the most important of all, along with loving God: to "Love your neighbor as yourself", also stated as "Do to others as you would have them do to you" and worded in other ways with the same meaning in the Old Testament (Hebrew Bible) and New Testament. Bussie's book includes stories of people important to her and of "love across differences in divided times". The book, published by Fortress Press, our ELCA publishing house, sold out online the first day of sales after the original publisher cancelled Bussie's contract because she refused to delete stories of people who are LGBTQ or Muslim. Although I think her language in a few places detracts, I highly recommend the book. Bussie is a professor of religion at Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota, one of our ELCA colleges.

Hallelujah ANYWAY: Rediscovering Mercy, (2017) Anne Lamott. This small book is a treasure bringing me smiles, laughter and a lot of reflection. "Mercy is radical kindness" Lamott states, learning to let go of judgement and the pain in our lives. She is literally 'in your face' with her humor and the straight forwardness of her message. I enjoyed the book so much (as I said-a quick read), that I read it a second time! Highly recommended. *Reviewed by Merry Van Deusen.* (The HTLC library has several other books by this author.)

Find The Good (2015) by Heather Lende. What a delightful book! The author lives in Haines, Alaska and writes obituaries for the local newspaper. She makes a decision to write about the good in people's lives. She engages the reader in some important life lessons. I found it inspiring and in

places very fun. I'd give it a 5-star rating! Inspiring and uplifting! *Reviewed by Dennis Duncan*

The Little Book of HYGGE (*hoo-ga*) 2017 by Meik Wiking. At first reading I thought this was kind of a joke. It isn't. It's 'Danish Fen Shui' on steroids. I loved it! Hygge means happy living. Wiking is the CEO of the Happiness Research Institute of Copenhagen and has done research for every kind of Danish Hygge. For instance, a happy Christmas is hyggelig, meaning happy, cheerful, warm and heartfelt. That takes care of the rest of the year also. Hygge is about gratitude and savoring the simple pleasures in life. Danes are considered the happiest people on earth. This is the guidebook for reaching that goal. I found it enjoyable to just relax and read it like a novel, but also letting the words sink in to be remembered. *Reviewed by Rosemary Petersen*

BOOKS FOR CHILDREN AND YOUNG READERS

The Tale of Urso Bruno, Little Father of All Bears (2003) by Brian Jacques; illustrated by Alexi Natchev. Brian Jacques' tale is a beautifully illustrated heroic fable describing how one miniature bear undertakes a rescue mission to free a multitude of captured animals and birds. A good read-to for younger readers. *Reviewed by Pam Bundy*

The Tin Forest (2001) by Helen Ward; illustrated by Wayne Anderson. A fascinating story about what dreams and imagination can create...from things discarded and no longer of use to most people. And into this quiet creation, real life comes and stays and grows, almost as grace and gives unimagined joy. Beautiful illustrations that give much to look at, look for, and think about. Children will enjoy...and adults too. *Reviewed by Merry Van Deusen*
